#### Head's Line:

Dear Hollyfield Community,

Thank you for your patience in awaiting our firm plans for the planned industrial action next Wednesday (1/2/23). I have now gathered more information from staff and am in a position to share the details with you.

As I said last week, the NEU (National Education Union) is planning industrial action on Wednesday 1 February. As a result of this action the following provision will be made:

- The school will be open as normal to those students in the sixth form. Mr Warren has written to parents to explain how students' school day will be managed if any of their teachers are taking part in the industrial action.
- The school will be closed to pupils in Year 7 Year 11. Students in Year 11 will move to online learning from home with a focus on English and Maths. Mr Buckman will write to parents with full details but I will summarise here. There will be online Maths and English lessons for all students in the morning and revision activities for students to complete independently in the afternoon. Year 11 students with an EHCP will be offered a place in school to complete the online learning, where they will be supported by our SEND team. Mrs Burrows will contact the parents of these students separately with full details.
  - If there are any Year 11 students who do not have access to a device with which to work from home, please contact Mr Bonehill on <a href="mailto:dbonehill@hollyfield.kingston.sch.uk">dbonehill@hollyfield.kingston.sch.uk</a> who will be delighted to help.
- Students in Year 7 Year 10 will be set enrichment activities on the google classroom which they can complete at home, if they wish to do so. Likewise, parents and carers may decide to make use of the time in another way.
- Students who we deem to be vulnerable have been offered a place in school where they will complete enrichment activities for the day. Mrs Burrows and Ms Patel have been in touch with parents of these students with details of the offer.
- If your child is eligible for free school meals then you should have received an email from Mr Winpenny with details of the supermarket vouchers you will receive in place of your child's meal. If you have not received communication from Mr Winpenny on this then please email him on <a href="mailto:mwinpenny@hollyfield.kingston.sch.uk">mwinpenny@hollyfield.kingston.sch.uk</a>

I am sure that parents will read this and potentially feel a sense of frustration. As I said last week, the school and the trust considers strike action to be a fundamental right of the profession. We thought about all the ways we could stay open including opening more year groups than we have committed to. However, the risk of not having enough staff to teach the students in school means that the school is closed to most students.

Whilst parents will, inevitably, experience some inconvenience, please remember that the industrial action has met all legal requirements and that any teacher going on strike will not have taken that decision lightly. As I said last week, whatever our political views are, all teachers, support staff and parents want the very best for the children in our community. With that in mind, I would encourage tolerance, sympathy and respect for everyone's rights whatever our political opinions might be.

### Reporting your child's absence

When reporting your child's absence from school on the dedicated absence line, please ensure you provide their name, year and registration group, reason for absence and your details, please ensure you spell out your child's name to ensure they are marked correctly.

### Valuables in school

The school policy and guidance with regard to pupil possessions is clear that they are brought into school at their own risk. The Hollyfield School does not accept liability for any items that may be lost, damaged or stolen. While theft is taken extremely seriously and thoroughly investigated, the school is not in a position to cover the cost of any item stolen.

Of course, with respect to the last point, steps and measures are put in place to mitigate against such circumstances, especially during PE and Games lessons, where pupils' items are locked in the changing rooms. While this is standard procedure, there may be some extenuating circumstances where this cannot always be guaranteed. Therefore, I would urge your son/daughter not to bring expensive items into school.

### Medical Health Care Plans

Please can we remind all parents to complete a MHCP for any student with a medical condition if you have not already done so. Also, if there are any changes to a current plan please complete and submit a new MHCP so we can update our records. You can <u>print a form</u> and return it to school.

### Changed your address/email/phone number????

If you have changed your contact details, please email the school office on <u>office@hollyfield.kingston.sch.uk</u> stating your child's name and form and the change of details. It is important to keep these details up to date in case of an emergency. Don't forget to update your Parentmail account with your new details.

### **Water Bottles**

Please ensure your child brings a water bottle with them to school every day, it is even more important during hot weather. Our water fountains can be used to refill bottles as necessary during break and lunch, it is not possible to drink from the fountains direct and we do not have bottles or cups to give out to students. Alternatively, bottles of water can be purchased (and refilled) in the cafeteria, please ensure your Parentmail account has enough funds to enable this.

### Surbiton Hill Road Entrance for cars

If you drive/collect students to or from school the visitor's car park/Surbiton Hill Road entrance <u>should not be used to dropoff students</u>. This causes congestion for people entering the site and staff access, cars travelling on Surbiton Hill Road and is potentially dangerous for pedestrians.

### Dinner Money Top Up

Please ensure funds are available 24 hours before they are required when topping up your child's dinner money on Parentmail. If you add funds on the day they are to be used we will not be able to see the credit instantly until the system has processed it, therefore creating a delay in your child buying food at the canteen.

At Hollyfield student voice is really important, therefore we have been building a student leadership team to work alongside the staff leadership team to support understanding and provision for safeguarding.



I have recently been working with Mrs McGeoch, Ms Patel and Mr Buckman trying to find ways how we can improve the school and make the students feel safer and not afraid to speak out and share their worries. I have been trying my very best to make everyone feel supported and think 'Oh! I feel comfortable talking to someone my age." and that's what we are trying to achieve with this project! As well as making sure the adults in the school understand us better and now how to help us in the way we want and need help. Everybody is welcome to take part in this. It doesn't matter what race, sexuality, religion, age - or how different you are, we just wanted to make sure our school is the best for all of the pupils.

So far Meah has led assemblies for all year groups in the school and appointed a team of students to help with the project. Our first meeting will be before the half term and we hope to be sharing updates on our work with parents through the newsletter!

### MISS O'SHEA'S TEACHING & LEARNING UPDATE

It has been a beautifully busy week for experiences beyond the classroom. Mr Case, who leads the RE and Philosophy department writes: 'On Monday and Wednesday this week, Year 9 students had the fantastic opportunity to experience an enriching talk from a local synagogue, KSDS, regarding the personal accounts and history surrounding the tragedy that is the Holocaust. We were fortunate enough to hear from two separate speakers, Bronia and Annick, alongside many volunteers from the synagogue, who shared their harrowing experiences during the Holocaust. The children were so well engaged and listened with respect and thoughtfulness, and it is clear from the impact it has had on them that this education will be something that will remain with them for the rest of their lives. Writing this on the anniversary of Holocaust Memorial Day, I want to personally thank all the students for their attendance and engagement, and I hope it was as striking for all of them as it was for myself. The Holocaust is a uniquely tragic event in human history, and while the events of World War Two may seem like history, the ramifications it had on Jewish people and the community are still felt to this day. I am grateful that our young people have had the opportunity to learn from survivors first hand, something that will not be available for coming generations; it is the responsibility of all of us to remember this sombre time in our history, lest we forget.' It does indeed sound like a fabulous learning experience. Thank you, Mr Case, for leading it.

The Maths department hosted a Primary Maths Challenge event for students from our local primary schools. The students (and some very keen parents) were given a series of mathematical challenges, which they had to complete in teams. It was a great chance for students to get to know the school and some of our teachers - and for the teachers to make that first connection with some future Hollyfielders! Huge thanks to the Maths department - and to Ms Wellstead and Ms Janse - for hosting.

Our GCSE and A Level Drama students (and some Year 9 students who are keen to take the subject in Year 10) have had several great experiences over the past few days. We led two evening theatre trips (one to The Donmar Warehouse to see 'Watch on the Rhine' and one to Woking Theatre to see 'The Ocean at the End of the Lane'). The students were impeccably



behaved and came back raving about the wonderful performances. They will write about these live theatre experiences in their written papers in the summer - and the shared experience is something we will all remember for a long time. Speaking of which, we were joined by two fabulous former drama students in recent days: Andy Buckley joined us by video call, to encourage Year 13 students who plan to apply to the prestigious Central School of Speech and Drama, which he attended after leaving Hollyfield. We also had a face-to-face visit from actor, director and film-maker Adam Morse. Since leaving us, Adam has had a glittering and varied career, having directed Billy Zane and Sadie Frost in a feature film and appearing on screen with Jason (Aquaman) Mamoa in the Apple TV series 'See'. These things (and the other exciting projects ahead) are all the more remarkable given that Adam is now registered blind. He told us that he may have lost his sight, but not his vision. We were all thoroughly inspired - and grateful for his candour and his encouragement of the students who may follow in his footsteps.

### Online Mental Health and Wellbeing Support for young people

Dear Parents/Carers

Over the coming weeks your child may mention they have been made aware by school or a professional of a service called Kooth. It provides a safe, secure means of accessing online emotional health support from a professional team of qualified counsellors and emotional wellbeing practitioners for ages **11-25** in **South West London**.

Kooth offers wellbeing support 365 days a year via a range of self-help materials and peer to peer support which young people are able to contribute to. Kooth also has an online wellbeing team from 12pm-10pm on weekdays and 6pm-10pm on weekends offering 1:1 text- based online counselling via live chat or messaging.

Kooth is free to access via any internet- enabled device. Your child simply needs to visit <a href="www.kooth.com">www.kooth.com</a> and click 'Join Kooth'. Everything is pre-moderated and age appropriate, in order to safeguard our users, so you know that what your child is accessing is safe.

Kooth will be working with all schools and professionals across 93% of the UK and growing to support students' mental health and wellbeing, both in and out of school. Alongside this, Kooth provides parent sessions, so keep in touch with the school or agencies to find out when the next ones are. I have pre recorded 2 sessions for you to watch. 



### **Overview**

As part of our growing Community Classrooms, from February 2023, Surbiton High School will offer an evening course in GCSE English Language for adults. The year-long course is designed to challenge adult learners in both fiction and non-fiction texts, with a combination of analytical and creative skills.
